COMMUNITY & SCHOOL POPULATION

Lincoln High School is Portland's first and oldest high school, one of ten comprehensive high schools in the Portland School District. Lincoln is located in the downtown area within easy walking distance of Portland State University, many museums, cultural events and exhibits.

Our school population consists of students from diverse educational and economic backgrounds. The majority

of parents are college educated, often with graduate degrees; many are professionals or business executives. A small number of students live in a rural area within the city limits. Lincoln has 10.5% of our students on Free or Reduced Lunch. Approximately 17% of the student population consists of students not residing in the attendance area, but attend Lincoln because of their interest in Lincoln's International Studies Center and International Baccalaureate

programs. The school has an average enrollment of 1421.

ACADEMIC PROGRAM

Lincoln High School is known as Portland's "school of excellence." It is noted for its academic climate and rigor, offering a comprehensive array of advanced classes in areas of art, English, world languages, math, science and social studies. Lincoln's curriculum is college preparatory and every course offers a strong academic component. Lincoln High School is one of two Portland Public Schools authorized to offer the **International Baccalaureate Diploma** program (IB), a comprehensive two-year curriculum for motivated students. Lincoln High School has an open program, where all students can choose to take IB classes. Full IB Diploma candidates are required to select one subject from each of six subject groups and meet defined standards and conditions on internationally set and graded exams, satisfactorily complete the Extended Essay, Theory of Knowledge and Creative, Action and Service activities. Students may also elect to receive IB certificates by passing individual exams.

Lincoln's **International Studies Center** program (ISC) attracts students interested in world languages and international studies. Students enrolled in ISC take four years of foreign language and participate in required activities that provide a perspective on cultural and global awareness. Community Service is also a component of this program. One quarter (¼) credit is earned each year.

Lincoln also provides an advanced **Spanish Immersion** curriculum for students completing eight years of the Spanish Immersion program at Ainsworth Elementary and West Sylvan Middle School. This unique specialized four-year program focuses on students developing fluency and using the Spanish language in interdisciplinary studies.

Lincoln students participate in a wide variety of activities and many students give back to their community through their participation in community service organizations, athletics, theater, competitions, clubs and youth groups. Lincoln takes pride in the level of involvement many students demonstrate in their activities. Certain activities are granted elective credit and are listed on the transcript.

1. A **Constitution class** is conducted for students involved with Lincoln's nationally acclaimed Constitution team. Students prepare for state competitions and the national competition "We The People." Students receive Government credit.
2. **Outdoor School** is a unique program offered through the county, where high school students serve as counselors, teachers and mentors to sixth graders who spend a week in the outdoors learning about science and environmental concepts.
